



# CLOSING DOWN OLD-TYPE INSTITUTIONS

#### CLOSING DOWN OLD-TYPE INSTITUTIONS

Almost 100,000 children were living in old-type institutions (orphanages) in 2000. In 2016, there were still approximately 8,000 children in institutions.

Traumas and the devastating consequences of institutionalization on children are among the harshest forms of abuse and violence.
Children growing up in institutions display delays in physical, cognitive and social development. Young adults leaving institutions face difficulties in becoming independent and are exposed to abuse, exploitation, trafficking or antisocial behaviour.

The alternative is the closure of the orphanages and finding the most appropriate solutions – as close as possible to the family environment – for the children in them. Some children can be reunited with their birth families, if they provide the right conditions. Others can be placed with foster-care parents or can adopted. The children who need specialised care (for whom neither family reintegration, nor

foster care work) are placed in small-group family homes.

Family reintegration is a process supported by a catalogue of care measures supporting children and families. To date,
Hope and Homes for Children has helped 798 children in reuniting with their families.

### SMALL-GROUP FAMILY HOMES

A small-group family home is a service that provides children and young adults an environment that is close to the family environment. There are 10-12 children living in a house and they receive education, care, emotional support and counselling for independent living. Hope and Homes for Children has opened 99 small-group family homes in Romania by the end of 2016.

Hope and Homes for Children's mission is to close down all orphanages in Romania by 2022.

## THE LAST ORPHANAGE IN OLT COUNTY WAS PERMANENTLY CLOSED

"Floare de Colţ" Institution, the last orphanage in Olt County, was closed down through the partnership between the Child Protection Department Olt and Hope and Homes for Children.

The partnership started in 2013, when there were 41 children and young adults in the institution, aged between 5 and 26, with mild, medium and severe special needs.


Hope and Homes for Children specialists helped in identifying the best transfer options for these children: social and professional integration, family reintegration, transfer to small-group family homes, or relocation to apartments and centres for adults with special needs.

The Hope and Homes for Children team assessed the children and carried out the social investigations for those who were reintegrated with their families; they visited the services where the children and young adults were transferred; they participated in individual cases management meetings with the team from the County Child Protection Department and collaborated with the institution's social worker and psychologist, as well as with other staff members.

Once this institution was closed, Olt County joined Maramureş, Hunedoara, Alba counties and District 6 of Bucharest, in which no longer function any old-type institutions.

## PREVENTING THE SEPARATION OF CHILDREN FROM THEIR FAMILIES

39% of the children in Romania live in poverty, according to the National Strategy on Social Inclusion and Poverty Reduction. They do not have clothes and shoes, they do not attend school or kindergarten and, some days, they do not even have food. This is what usually makes parents abandon them in state care, in orphanages, where they have food, but where they lack affection.

Hope and Homes for Children believes that the family is the top priority when it comes to the best interest of the child and we support keeping the children with their parents through various forms of assistance. The action plan is personalized and specialists, based on particular criteria and indicators, decide to the best interest of the child.

Between 2001 and 2016, our organisation worked with 3,067 families in 19 counties and

Bucharest, in the programme dedicated to preventing the separation of children from their families. 8,771 children received direct help to remain with their families, while for 17,727 other children our organisation contributed with technical and financial assistance to prevent their separation from families.

The programme dedicated to preventing the separation of children from their families is complementary to the process of closing down orphanages. On the one hand, it is critical that other children do not end up in institutions and, on the other, the programme helps to reduce or even stop the placement of children in state care.

Since 2001, a total of 25,787 children remained with their families due to the interventions carried out by Hope and Homes for Children and its partners.



Hope and Homes for Children believes that the family is the top priority when it comes to the best interest of the child and we support keeping the children with their parents through various forms of assistance.

Whether it's counselling or material support, the intervention is focused on the individual needs of the family and a team of specialists decides what kind of intervention is needed in order to prevent the separation of children from their families.



#### THE FOURTH EDITION, THE LOVE EDITION

The fourth edition of the Hope Concert, the gala organized by Hope and Homes for Children to support vulnerable children in Romania, took place on April 10<sup>th</sup>, at the Romanian Athenaeum.

Both classical and pop songs were re-orchestrated and adapted to be played by Violoncellissimo, a cello ensemble.

More than 800 guests attended the gala, among which were the Romanian Prime Minister, Dacian Ciolos, princess Marina Sturdza, patron of Hope and Homes for Children, ministers, ambassadors, representatives of central and local authorities, representatives of partner companies, supporters, journalists, and celebrities. Corina Caragea and Simona Pope from PRO TV, Vladimir Drăghia, Andreea Răducan, Corina Ungureanu, Malvina Cservenschi, actors Dorian Boguță and Ada Condeescu have shown this way their support for the most vulnerable children in Romania.



## ZOLI TOTH DONATED BICYCLES TO BENEFICIARIES OF HOPE AND HOMES FOR CHILDREN PROGRAMMES

The "Pedal and donate with I'Velo" campaign organised by Green Revolution Association, during which the kilometres rode with bicycles in Bucharest and recorded in the I'Velo application transformed into bicycles to be donated, was the means through which the musician Zoli Toth gifted bicycles to beneficiaries supported by Hope and Homes for Children.

Adriana (21 years old, Baia Mare), student at the Post-Secondary Sanitary School and the Faculty of Mineral Resources and Environment, received one of the bicycles. Adriana no longer has parents, she lives in social housing and she is supported by our organisation to fulfil her dream to become a doctor.

The second bicycle reached Marius (17 years old, Baia Mare),

who lives in a small-group family home built by our organisation. Although he is close to his parents and three siblings, Marius prefers to live in the small group-family home and does not want to be reintegrated, because of the poor living conditions of his family. He is a 9<sup>th</sup> grade student at a vocational school and works at a car wash.

The third bicycle was given to a family with 8 children in Alba County. Initially, all the children were institutionalised because of poverty, but their mother stayed in touch with them and visited them often. With support from the Foundation, the parents managed to bring their children back with the family and to create the proper living conditions to keep them together.



I wanted a bicycle so badly! With it, I will get to school faster, I will save money on transportation and, most importantly, I will work out.

I can say that it is part of my family now. It has made my life so much easier.

#### EDUCATIONAL PROGRAMME FOR THE CHILDREN FROM A DISADVANTAGED COMMUNITY

During the summer holiday, in the "Pirită" disadvantaged community in Baia Mare, took place the educational support programme "Summer Kindergarten" for the children living in this community. The programme was initiated by Claudia Costea (Maramureş Child Protection Department), as a partnership between state institutions and NGOs, and consisted in recreational and educational activities aimed at preparing 60 children, aged between 3 and 16, to enrol, or re-enrol, in school or kindergarten.

The children who participated in these activities live in a community of improvised huts, without electricity, with a single water source, consisting in a pipe connected directly to the public water system. Among garbage, rats and dogs, the children are either left unsupervised during the day or work with their parents gathering scraps of iron in town or in the neighbouring communities. The children, who speak only Romani at home, do not attend school or kindergarten and they miss out on the natural socializing experiences, as well as the exercise of intellectual effort.

The activities were organised according to age groups, 3-10 years and 11-18 years, and began with simple things, such as rules for personal hygiene, and then continued with more complex topics, like guidance for group integration. With help from volunteers, the children learned to eat and wash themselves properly, and to talk politely to those around them. The younger children learnt to hold a pencil, to colour and to recognize letters and numbers.

The children also enjoyed recreational activities: watching cartoons and playing in the kindergarten and in the courtyard. Every day, they received breakfast (a bun, fruits) and, at lunch, a warm meal provided by our organisation. As the activities took place, it was noticeable how the children's interest was growing, along with their will to participate in the programme every day.

Apart from the activities carried out with the children, the Hope and Homes for Children specialists held counselling sessions for parents to motivate them to enrol their children in a form of education. The social workers from Baia Mare Local Social Services carried out the social assessments of the families and the nurses registered the children with a family doctor. The parents were encouraged to see what their children were doing during the programme, and activities involving both children and parents were organised.

Partners: Maramureş Child Protection Department, Baia Mare Local Social Services, Maramureş County Education Inspectorate, Somaschi Foundation for Volunteers At the end of the summer holiday, with support from the School Orientation Commission, 24 children were enrolled in kindergarten, 20 children in the "Second Chance" form of education and another 30 were integrated into different grades at a school in the neighbourhood. The children's lives have dramatically changed for the better, not just from an educational point of view, but also from the way in which they perceive the world, from being able to trust others and give back.

## 15 SWIMMERS "MADE WAVES" FOR HOPE AND HOMES FOR CHILDREN

15 swimmers chose to support the cause of Hope and Homes for Children by participating in the Bucharest Swimathon and raised more than 12,000 lei. Their goal: to support 30 children in staying home, with their families. Among the swimmers was also the musician Zoli Toth.

The swimmers were organised into three teams – Team Hope 1, Team Hope 2 and UPC Romania for Hope – and had a single purpose: to swim as many pool lengths as possible and raise the amount they set for themselves. The money was used to assess the situation of every child and to create specialised intervention plans for each child and family, as well as to provide the children and parents with the necessary material support and counselling, so that they can overcome the situation they were in or to facilitate their access to social benefits, as needed.

#### RAIFFEISEN BANK BUCHAREST MARATHON

Team Hope, Hope and Homes for Children's team of runners, participated for the third time in the Bucharest Marathon.

A total of 400 runners chose to support Hope and Homes for Children and the cause of vulnerable children. 50 volunteers, among which was the musician Zoli Toth, supported the runners both at the Team Hope tent and on the route, at the water points.

Deutsche Bank and RSM Romania had their own teams of runners who supported Team Hope's cause. Ciprian Bălănescu, duathlon, triathlon and aquathlon national champion, ranked 11th in the overall ranking. Raised in the child-protection system, Ciprian wants to prove, with his actions, that "nothing is impossible, you just need to want it bad enough".

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Among the Team Hope runners were Vladimir Drăghia; Dragos Bucurenci; Dragos Doros, president of the National Agency for Fiscal Administration (ANAF); Paul Gheorghiu, head of the Prime Minister's Office; Claudiu Vrînceanu, Secretary of State in the Ministry of Economy, Commerce and Business Environment; Mihai Liseţchi, Secretary of State in the Ministry for Public Consultation and Civic Dialogue; and Cristian Botan, counsellor in the Prime Minister's Office.

Team Hope Performer, which included Cristian Vorovenci, Andrei Ștefana, Nicolae Soare and Sergiu Ciobanu, ranked 1st in the men's relay race and dedicated their award to the children we support to remain with their families and enjoy happy childhoods.



During the Nativity Fast (November 15<sup>th</sup> – December 24<sup>th</sup>), Hope and Homes for Children organised the campaign "The Meaning of Fasting", which aimed to give another purpose to the days of fasting. "The Meaning of Fasting" challenged people to fast for one day and donate the value of that day's meals to the children who live with less than 5 lei/day.

Those who wanted to support the campaign accessed rostulpostului.ro and chose the food and drinks they would have consumed in one day and then donated online the amount of money they were worth. Therefore, more than 1,500 dishes and drinks were donated, raising a total of 32,000 lei.

During the 40 days of campaign, more than 500 public figures,

journalists and ordinary people gave up food, some virtually, others for real, in order to help the children who live in poverty. The start of the campaign was given by Amalia Enache (PRO TV), Dragoş Bucurenci, Ştefan Dărăbuş and Magor Csibi (WWF Romania). They were joined by the actress Oana Pellea, Corina Caragea (PRO TV presenter), Vladimir Drăghia, musician Zoli Toth, actor Marius Manole, fitness trainer Cori Grămescu. photographer Alex Gâlmeanu, Raluca Arvat (TVR 2), Alin "Coiotu" Dincă (lead singer of the Band Trooper and DJ at Rock FM), Laura Cosoi, Andreea Ibacka, who have challenged others to support this initiative, too.

# CHRISTMAS PRESENTS

#### FOR 600 CHILDREN IN 10 COUNTIES

600 children from the programme dedicated to preventing the separation of children from their families wrote to Santa Claus at the beginning of December. Most of the children in this nationwide programme never had the chance to enjoy the winter holidays and presents, like most other children had.

The letters of the children reached the employees of BRD – Groupe Société Générale, who mobilized for the second year in a row to make the children's wishes come true. Each letter was read carefully and then the presents the children asked for were bought and wrapped. The nicely wrapped packages were then sent to Child Protection Departments in 10 counties.

Some of the children asked for an orange – they had never received

a present before - or health for them and their family. The more courageous ones wrote what they wanted to receive, but they did not forget to ask for something for their siblings. The social workers from Hope and Homes for Children and 10 Child Protection Departments were Santa's messengers and gave out the presents to the 600 children. It was a great surprise for them, and the happiness of getting the very things they had asked for was even greater. Therefore, Christmas became a fairytale holiday, just like every child should experience.

# SOCIAL AND PROFESSIONAL INTEGRATION OF YOUNGSTERS LEAVING THE CHILD PROTECTION SYSTEM

Every year, around 3,000 youngsters, aged between 18 and 27, leave the child protection system without being prepared for independent life or, in some of the more fortunate cases, with limited preparation, while the staff interacting with these young people are rarely trained to help them.

Thrust in a situation where they will have to manage on their own, after a lifetime in an institution, youngsters are not able to cope with daily tasks. They have poorly developed communication skills, low self-esteem, behaviour and attitude issues, they find it hard to establish meaningful relationships, they are vulnerable and risk exploitation. All these make them feel alone, isolated in a foreign world. Sometimes, young people remain in state care for the rest of their lives, because they are incorrectly diagnosed with special needs that do not allow them to live independently or they

are not provided with the necessary support to have a semi-independent life.

The social and professional integration of these youngsters with support from Hope and Homes for Children means improving their independent living skills (through counselling and material support), creating the prerequisites for integrating them on the labour market (through counselling, mediation, recommendations), and providing them with a place to live, with the involvement of local authorities.

Hope and Homes for Children began the programmes to assist and support vulnerable young people leaving state care in 2002. Until now, 862 youngsters were supported to become successfully integrated into society.



## WINTER GAMES FOR CHILDREN AND YOUNG PEOPLE WITH SPECIAL NEEDS

Starting in 2002, Hope and Homes for Children has been organising the Special Winter Games, a sports event aiming to socially integrate children and young people with special needs through spare time activities and winter-specific sports events.

140 children with special needs from the state child-protection services in Maramureş County, and from ASSOC and Esperando Association, participated in the 14th edition of the games. Corina Caragea, PRO TV Sports News presenter, and Dragoş Bucurenci joined the children for this event.

Organised into 12 teams, the children took turns in participating

in all the events: football and hopscotch on snow, tug-of-war and relay race with egg and spoon, sleighing, throwing snowballs at the target and building snowmen. The fun on the slope ended with excitement, as each participant received diplomas, medals and presents from Corina and Dragos. They were all very happy about this day and about the activities they participated in, considering it "an unforgettable day".

They were also part of mine, as was the hopscotch, the snowmen and the football in the schoolyard. 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# A WEEK FULL OF ADVENTURES FOR THE CHILDREN IN HOPE AND HOMES FOR CHILDREN'S PROGRAMMES

In July, the children from "Dealul Florilor" and "Mogoșești" smallgroup family homes had the adventure of a lifetime: climbing and zip-lining, archery, creative workshops, first-aid class and survival lessons, as part of the Survival Camp Şuior (Maramureş County). Divided into teams, they built shelters made of wood, branches, cardboard boxes or egg cartons, based on the information they got during the creative workshops. They also received information from the mountain police on how to survive in nature and to make use of what the environment provides.

The camp ended with a big campfire, to which all children contributed: they gathered wood from the forest and put into practice the skills gained in the "How to build a fire under proper and safe circumstances" course. For their courage, team spirit and discipline, much needed in such a camp, each participant was rewarded with a "Survivor" diploma.

#### THE ART AND SOLIDARITY CAMP, 12TH EDITION

The Art and Solidarity Camp in Desesti (Maramures County) started from the idea of priest loan Ardelean and has become a true art school that promotes a mentoring relationship between valuable contemporary artists and children and young artists from the child protection system. For the latter, the camp provides the opportunity to develop their imagination, aesthetic sense, their skills or even to discover their artistic inclination in an oasis of joy and peace.

The theme of the 2016 edition was "Tradition in the rural world". Fifty children and young adults from small group family homes developed by Hope and Homes for Children and from foster care and prevention programmes that we have developed in laşi, Neamţ, Botoşani, Bistriţa, Cluj and

Maramureş counties participated in the camp and were guided by famous artists. The young artists unleashed their imagination and created paintings of the village world, rendering the beauty of Maramureş in the most wonderful images and colours.

The list of activities also included a trip to the Merry Cemetery in Săpânţa, a campfire, music and folk dance recitals, poetry reading and workshops for survival techniques and information on juvenile delinquency, in collaboration with the Romanian Gendarmerie.

## FOR YOUNG PEOPLE LEAVING THE CHILD-PROTECTION SYSTEM

The initiative of building the Centre for Transit, Assistance and Counselling for young people who leave the child protection system in Baia Mare (Transit Centre) started from a severe lack of support from the state for these young people and from the specialists in the system, who lack a tradition of efficient planning and managing the young people's transition towards independent life.

The building of the Centre began in November 2015, with financial support from Kaufland Romania, on a piece of land offered by the Baja Mare Town Hall.

The Centre consists of 19 studio apartments and provides young

people leaving the child protection system, or those who have left the system years ago, with accommodation over a period of 6 to 24 months, as well as with support from a social worker, a psychologist and a nurse. The Centre was donated to the Local Social Services in Baia Mare and will continue to function under the monitoring of Hope and Homes for Children. Our organisation also trained the specialists from the Baia Mare Local Social Services whose task is to administer this project.

# THE REFORM OF THE CHILD PROTECTION SYSTEM

### THE REFORM OF THE CHILD-PROTECTION SYSTEM

Hope and Homes for Children contributes to the process of reforming the child-protection system through strategic partnerships with the Romanian Government, the Ministry of Labour and Social Justice and UNICEF, as well as through collaborations with County Child Protection Departments (CPDs).

Hope and Homes for Children is an organisation specialised in training professionals, able to provide training programmes for all staff, from direct care specialists in institutions to managers of child protection services.

In its 19 years of activity, our organisation developed its own educational platform and a training centre in Baia Mare. The curriculum includes inception courses for the staff working in institutions and preparing for transition towards family-type alternative services, consultancy provided to authorities

in Romania and international technical assistance, as well as the development of programmes based on the specific needs identified in each context. Our organisation provided technical assistance to public services specialised in child protection in Bosnia, Belarus, Ukraine, the Republic of Moldova, Kosovo, Albania, Rwanda, Sudan, Azerbaijan and Georgia, as well as to countries in Latin America (Argentina, Uruguay and Mexico).

Up to this point, 8,125 staff members in the child protection system in Romania and in 10 other countries in Europe and Africa have been trained. In 2016, our organisation collaborated with 15 County Child Protection Departments, supporting them in their efforts to reform the child protection system at county level.



# 14 YEARS OF REFORM OF THE CHILD-PROTECTION SYSTEM IN ROMANIA

At the end of 2016, our partnership with Absolute Return for Kids (ARK) – one of the most important international organisations in the field of child protection, came to an end.

The partnership, started in 2002, was aimed to support the authorities in reforming the child protection system and resulted in 15,141 children supported to remain with their families, 38 institutions closed or in the process of closure and 2,555 children leaving institutions for family type environments, 66 small group

homes or apartments developed or renovated, 4,202 young adults supported to leave the childcare system and 6,333 professionals in the field of child protection trained.

The end of the partnership was celebrated by an event organised at the residence of the UK Ambassador in Bucharest, His Excellency Mr. Paul Brummel. The special guest of the evening was the pianist Sergiu Tuhuţiu, who held a piano recital.

### MODERNIZING THE CHILD-PROTECTION SYSTEM

Hope and Homes for Children aims to improve or gain the skills necessary for child-care professionals and specialists to work with children in state care, in programmes to prevent the separation of children from their families or with young people leaving care.

Therefore, our organisation participated or organised, in 2016, several activities, among which the most important are:

 training 120 specialists from the Maramureş Child Protection
 Department and from educational centres through the project entitled "Social Inclusion of Children Through Access to Education", in partnership with the Local Social Services in Baia Mare:

- participating in elaborating the National Strategy on Social Inclusion and Poverty Reduction developed by the Romanian Government;
- "IMPACT Working with children with special needs and challenging behaviour: challenges and solutions" training sessions, together with Autism Services Inc. (SUA), attended by psychologists, social workers, speech therapists, physiotherapists, coordinators of services for children with special needs and educators in seven counties:
- a meeting with 40 directors of Local Social Services in several counties in order to discuss means to develop integrated projects at community level and to provide a development

- model for different types of social services, based on the model of those implemented in Baia Mare through the Strategy for Social Protection and Action Plan for Child Protection:
- participating in the workshop "De-institutionalisation of children in Romania today" organised by the World Bank;
- organising, in partnership with Bacău CPD, the seminar "Preventing the separation of children from their families in the context of the reform process and the opportunities regarding structural funds", targeting CPD representatives, mayors and social workers from Bacău, Botoşani, Neamţ, laşi, Suceava and Vaslui counties;

 involvement in the "Opening Doors" campaign, organised at the EU level, regarding the allocation of grant funds for de-institutionalisation and preventing the separation of children from their families.







# A SUMMER IN KINDERGARTEN

For most of us, summer is the season of holidays, a time we choose to spend with our loved ones, in nature, in the mountains or at the seaside, relaxing and having a great time. Not all of us see summer and holidays the same, though: for children in poor communities, most of them of Roma ethnicity, summer is the season of the kindergarten.

Summer kindergartens are a way in which these children are drawn towards school, helped to be educationally integrated and to fill in the gaps caused by lack of preschool education.

They lack the necessary skills, a behaviour adapted to school regulations, they don't know how to relate to other children, to the teachers and so, without any support, they are marginalized and give up attending school altogether. In the summer of 2016, such a Summer Kindergarten Programme took place in Baia Mare, in the Pirită area.

For two months, a team from Hope and Homes for Children took part in activities aimed to educate and develop these children to



be accepted and integrated in the society. Anamaria Vid-Pop, Gabriela Ghiroltean, Oana Nașcu and Claudia Bude (psychologists), Sorina Moldovan and Terezia Silaghi (educators), apart from their office work, spent a lot of time with the children and parents. Many of them had never had a piece of paper for colouring in their hands and they discovered, with fascination, how many things they can do with it. They didn't even know how to eat or wash their hands, let alone say "hello" or when their birthdays were, how old they were, or what their full names were.

Therefore, every day we got to see that the childhood joys are very different.

Children were amazed by, and delighted with, bathroom sinks, water and soap, toothbrush and toothpaste - things they didn't know how to use - or the toilets in the kindergarten. They were happy we taught them how to hold a pencil, that we helped them succeed, to discover, to colour, to write and learn letters and numbers, colours. days of the week; to communicate, to express themselves, to be polite; to sing, to learn poems, to patiently watch cartoons, to call each other by their real names, not nicknames; to appreciate themselves, to discover their qualities.

I felt how important it was for everyone (children and young people, and their parents) the fact that we listened and paid attention to them, and that we played games together. We were happy to see them smile every time we told them how beautiful they were or when we gave them a warm hug. The parents were also invited to counselling and parental guidance sessions organised by psychologists and educators from Hope and Homes for Children. In this way, they had the opportunity to talk about children's health issues and about the prejudice that follows them everywhere - at school, at the doctor's, in the shops.

Summer went by in a blur. We only felt the intensity of every moment, our every experience. Although we work with children, we sensed the time spent at the Summer Kindergarten in a different way.

The children and young people in this community, as well as their parents, are now much happier. The Summer Kindergarten gave them confidence. They truly wish to continue to learn. Many of them have made tremendous progress.

For us, the Hope and Homes for Children team, what matters the most is having been part of such change, having spent a summer to give them a better life.
